

Dinnington First School Equality Duty Statement

Dinnington First School is committed to applying the equality duty. Objective	Action
To narrow the gap between the progress made by 'all' children and that made by 'groups' of children such as those eligible for the Pupil Premium.	Carry out regular data analysis. Focus on the attainment and progress of vulnerable children and any gender differences during pupil progress meetings. Create a whole school provision plan for vulnerable children that identifies barriers to learning and how learning will be supported.
To improve knowledge, skills and attitudes to enable pupils to appreciate and value difference and diversity, for example increasing understanding between pupils from different faith communities.	Focus on difference and diversity; -in assemblies -in PSHCE and SEAL sessions -through an enriched curriculum -through focus weeks on diversity and differencecelebrations of different cultural events throughout the year.

To ensure that children in all groups have equal access to all school activities.

Equal representation / opportunities for boys and girls.

Monitor participation in after school activities and sports clubs and make adjustments so that all children can participate if they want to.

Fund places at any after school activity or sports' club where a charge is made, for children within vulnerable groups.
